
## **Report Submission and Attendance**

SRC Environmental Officer Report

# Global Issue: Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Plant Introduction

The Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Plant, located on the east coast of Japan, experienced a catastrophic nuclear disaster in March 2011 due to an earthquake and tsunami. This report examines the environmental impact of the disaster, ongoing challenges, and the efforts being undertaken for recovery and clean up.

#### **Historical Context**

The Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Plant, operated by Tokyo Electric Power Company Holdings (TEPCO), suffered a triple meltdown following the 9.0 magnitude Tōhoku earthquake and subsequent tsunami on March 11, 2011. The disaster led to the release of radioactive materials into the atmosphere, soil, and ocean.

## **Environmental Impact**

The disaster had wide-ranging environmental effects:

1. Radioactive Contamination: The release of radioactive isotopes, including caesium and iodine, contaminated air, water, soil, and marine resources.



- 2. Ecosystem Disruption: Radiation affected flora and fauna, causing shifts in local ecosystems and food chains.

## **Ongoing Challenges**

Challenges persist years after the disaster:

- 1. Radioactive Water: The plant has accumulated vast amounts of contaminated water used for cooling the reactors. Disposing of this water, particularly tritium, remains contentious.
- 2. Decommissioning: The process of decommissioning the damaged reactors is complex, requiring innovative technologies and a long-term commitment.
- 3. Waste Management: Properly managing radioactive waste and contaminated materials is essential for preventing further environmental harm.

## Recovery

Multiple initiatives are aimed at addressing the aftermath of the disaster:

- 1. Decommissioning Plan: TEPCO outlined a multi-decade plan for decommissioning the reactors and removing spent fuel.
- 2. Containment: Efforts include constructing a sarcophagus-like structure around the damaged reactor buildings and using remote-controlled robots for cleanup.
- 3. Decontamination: Soil and vegetation in affected areas are being decontaminated to reduce radiation exposure.
- 4. Community Involvement: Local communities are being engaged in decision-making processes, and efforts are being made to restore normalcy.

## **International Impact**

The Fukushima disaster had profound implications beyond Japan:

- 1. Nuclear Safety: The disaster underscored the need for stringent safety measures, emergency preparedness, and clear communication in the nuclear industry.
- 2. Global Scrutiny: The incident sparked international debates on the role of nuclear energy and prompted countries to revaluate their own nuclear power programs.

## **Conclusion**

The Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Plant disaster had far-reaching environmental consequences, highlighting the importance of safety, preparedness, and responsible management of nuclear facilities. Recovery and clean-up efforts are ongoing, requiring collaboration, innovation, and international cooperation. Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Plant will continue to shape environmental and nuclear policy for years to come.

I will continue to look into future environmental issues ensuring the protection, preservation and conservation at The University of Adelaide. Additionally, I will keep track and update towards the SRC regarding issues of the environment to be involved within the community.
