6.1. President

Dear Council Members,

After a period of challenges that temporarily affected our council's functionality, I am pleased to confirm we are now fully positioned to continue delivering on our commitments. I extend my heartfelt thanks to the student representatives who have consistently placed student needs first, advocating passionately during this uncertain time.

As we step into the final year before the University merger, I am deeply honoured to serve once again as your SRC President. At the beginning of my term in 2024, I established four strategic pillars to guide our work: Health and Wellbeing, Academic Excellence and Employability, Inclusivity and Diversity, and Sustainability. These pillars remain at the heart of my efforts efforts as we continue to shape a supportive, inclusive, and forward-thinking campus community through advocacy.

Among our commitment, the SRC Food Pantry stands out as a powerful testament to the strength and compassion of our student body. Since developing this idea to launching it as a subcommittee of YouX with support from SRC Officers, the Pantry has supported over 4,000 students, significantly addressing food insecurity and demonstrating what we can accomplish through solidarity and collaboration. Beyond these core initiatives, the SRC has reinforced its commitments to inclusivity and sustainability—from advocating for mature-aged and international student support, to petitioning for



continued funding for essential programs like the Period Poverty Program and Gender-Based Violence prevention initiatives.

Student Passing and Media Enquiry

On 8 May 2025, the SRC received a media enquiry from Channel 10 regarding the tragic passing of University of Adelaide student Samiya Malik. As I was not personally aware of the incident nor had any contact from her family or friends, I considered it inappropriate to provide detailed comment without further information.

I advised YouX marketing that while we are deeply saddened by the loss, we were not in a position to speak personally about Samiya just yet. I plan to raise this matter at the next Council meeting to check if any Officer has been contacted or is connected.

If any SRC Officer knew Samiya personally, has been contacted by her friends or family, or would like to assist by speaking to Channel 10, please contact me directly.

Delegation of Authority for YouX Amalgamation Related Affairs

Since early 2024, I have actively represented the SRC as part of the University Merger Student Representation Working Group, advocating for the protection and strengthening of student voice in the context of the proposed amalgamation between the University of Adelaide and the University of South Australia.

Through these efforts, it has been agreed between YouX, USASA, and the universities that a Student Representative Council will continue to exist within the new student association. However the



governance, form and membership of the SRC has not been established and its currently an ongoing process.

Given the pace of developments and the importance to perform actions to ensure the SRC's interests are properly explored, protected, and advanced during this transitional and uncertain period, it is appropriate for Council to formally delegate authority to the President to act as the principal representative on merger-related matters.

Motion:

That the Student Representative Council:

- 1. Appoints the President as the principal representative and liaison of the SRC in matters arising from or related to YouX's proposed amalgamation, including any engagement and actions with YouX or other relevant stakeholders.
- 2. Authorises the President to explore, initiate, and coordinate any preliminary inquiries, proposals, or actions necessary to assess the options available to the SRC in the context of the merger, including governance, structural, and operational implications, and to report findings or recommendations to Council for deliberation and transparency.

7. YouX SRC Queer Officer's Report

The past few weeks have been extraordinarily busy in the Queer Space. The organisation of the Dr Duncan Memorial was clearly at the forefront of everyone's minds, with there existing immense difficulties in receiving funding. It was put to my attention that a number of people within the university were interested in holding their own event which quickly fell through. Due to their high budget though, some of us suspected that there might be a chance of finding funding somewhere within the university to make it a bigger event. All such attempts at receiving more funding resulted in failure forcing us to make a number of difficult decisions at the last minute. Without the prompt assistance of Tony Gunn, the YouX Student Engagement Coordinator, we would have struggled to receive the funding that we needed.

I wish to shout-out the staff's new Pride Network, who showed a strong willingness in getting involved in spite of having little to no resources to work with. In my personal view, this willingness to collaborate is what allows the essence of community to flourish. The Pride Club played a substantial primary role in organising the event; graciously hosting the pre-ceremonial Afternoon Tea in the Rainbow Room with a few non-committee members even deciding to graciously help out with some on-the-day organisation. Without the special contribution of the Pride Club Treasurer Marika Colby to budgeting, purchasing products, and object procurement during the week we would have likely been rushing around last-minute trying to pull the event together.

The presence of a series of politicians from the Labor Party shows testament as to how important remembering Dr Duncan is, as is commemorating the 50th Anniversary of homosexual acts between males being decriminalised. I would like to thank Professor John Williams AM, Ian Hunter MLC, Rob Simms MLC, Elizabeth (Birdie) Jagersma, Natrydd Sigurthur, and Will Sergeant OAM for each taking the time out of their day to contribute to our event and speak to people. In my opinion, having around 25-30 people present at the event – which includes a range of politicians that were not even scheduled in to speak, is a personal win.

I am grateful to have been offered the opportunity to host the event, and most certainly look to learn from the mistakes that I made in the lead-up to it as well as during the ceremony. I also wish to formally apologise for the un-tempered and uncontrolled passion that I showed during speaking, and wish that I had spent more time in preparing my script and fixing errors, especially those that were present within the introductions of multiple of our Ceremony's speakers. I shall endeavour to not



make any attempts in the future to balance the difficult role of emcee with that of speaker, and will do my absolute best to seek earlier feedback from other organisers. I've had to learn a harsh lesson in the Ceremony's aftermath to not let myself get ambitiously overconfident in my personal capacity and abilities.

The Queer Rights Department has also been formalised, and due to not receiving the maximum number of nominations all who applied have been automatically appointed. I wish to congratulate Scarlet Betterman for being appointed as the Department's Chair by the Pride Club President and look forward to working with her in fighting for the rights of Queer students here at Adelaide. The community has desperately needed a radical wing, divorced from factional politics, for quite some time. It is my hope that this year the new members of the Department are able to prove the necessity for such an institution and potentially ease the amount of commitments and work that the Queer Officer has had to do almost single-handedly for over the past decade. It is also my hope that the more we are able to accomplish, the more people who will be interested in contributing over future years.

Regarding the Waite Rainbow Room petition that I submitted last week, those of us from the North Terrace in tandem with interested students and staff on the Waite campus will soon look to meet with the school as well as infrastructure to determine a path forward for Queer students at Waite to get access to a safe on-campus space.

7.1. Postgraduate (Coursework) Officer

Postgraduate Coursework Report – SRC Update

Student Feedback and Academic Experience Over the past few weeks, I've had the chance to speak with several postgraduate students, and a few recurring concerns have come up that I'd like to bring to your attention:

- Struggles with Maths: A lot of students are having a tough time with mathematics. Given that everyone comes from different academic backgrounds. While the Maths Learning Centre is there to help, several students have mentioned that the support they're receiving just isn't enough. It might be time to revisit how this service is structured and promoted.
- Large Lecture Sizes: Many students are finding it difficult to engage in lectures with large class sizes. This is especially challenging in courses that require more interaction or detailed explanations. It's something we may want to look into to ensure a better learning experience for everyone.
- Assessment Overload: In some subjects, students are being asked to submit major design assignments and sit for tests on the same day. This kind of scheduling makes it hard for them to perform well in either task.

Student Wellbeing and Support Services

- Networking Events: We really appreciate the effort the university puts into hosting networking events they're a great opportunity for students. That said, many of these event's clash with assignment deadlines, so students often can't attend. It would help if these were scheduled earlier in the semester, maybe before the mid-semester break, when students have a bit more breathing time.
- Canteen Hours During Exams: With exams around the corner, students are spending longer hours on campus. It would be incredibly helpful if the canteens in the Hub Central could



extend their hours during this time. Just having access to food a bit later in the day could really ease the pressure.

• Stress Relief for Trimester Students: Lastly, while it's great to see stress relief activities being offered for semester students, those in trimester programs often miss out. Extending these initiatives to include trimester students would ensure everyone has access to the same level of support.

7.4. Mature Aged Officer

Hi everyone,

As the Mature Age Officer, I recognise that mature age students often experience isolation and a lack of belonging within the university community. Fortunately, we already have an active Mature Students Association (MSA) on campus, which provides a strong foundation to address these issues. My approach is to work closely with the MSA to strengthen their impact and reach. First, I propose establishing a formal partnership between the SRC and the MSA, so that we can work as allies in advocating for mature age students. This partnership would include regular communication and collaboration to ensure their voices are heard at the SRC level.

Second, I aim to support the MSA by helping to promote their events and activities through SRC's official social media channels and communication platforms. By increasing visibility, we can ensure more mature age students are aware of and can access these opportunities.

Third, I have identified that the university currently provides a Mature Students Lounge, which is a valuable space for mature age students to relax and connect. However, I have received feedback from students raising concerns about the quality and suitability of the furniture and facilities in the lounge. I plan to gather more feedback from students regarding their needs and preferences for this space, and



to work with the SRC and the Mature Students Association to advocate for improvements to make the lounge more comfortable, accessible, and family-friendly.

Fourth, I will advocate for the university to offer more tailored support services for mature age students, including career development workshops, employment advice, and wellbeing programs that address both physical and mental health needs. I believe that collaborating with the MSA, Student Wellbeing, the Careers Service, and other departments can help create targeted initiatives that better support the unique challenges faced by mature age students.

Finally, I propose setting up a dedicated online community, such as a Facebook group or a messaging platform, where mature age students can freely share their ideas, raise concerns, and receive updates in real time. This community would create a more informal and accessible way for students to engage, stay connected, and have their voices heard beyond formal meetings or surveys.

Through these combined efforts — formal partnership, greater promotion, advocacy for improved facilities, expanded support services, and a direct communication channel — we can create a more connected, inclusive, and supportive environment for mature age students at the University of Adelaide.

8. Other Motions on Notice

National Day of Action to Cut Ties with Trump's America

Far-right billionaire Donald Trump sits at the head of the most powerful and militaristic state in the world. He is using that power to spearhead a revival of American military supremacy and a global movement of reaction against working-class people and oppressed groups.

Australia is not immune from these global shifts in politics. Billionaires here like Clive Palmer and Gina Rinehart have embraced the cause of Trumpism and want to push politics to the right here as well.

Students need to stand up to this far-right threat and demand that Australia cut ties with Trump's America. The \$368 billion earmarked for nuclear-powered submarines as part of the AUKUS deal should be spent on healthcare, education, and housing.

The 24 May National Day of Action demanding Australia cut ties with Trump's America is an important initiative on the part of Students for Palestine groups, independent peace activists, IPAN, Labor Against War, and other organisations. The SRC welcomes this initiative and pledges its support.
